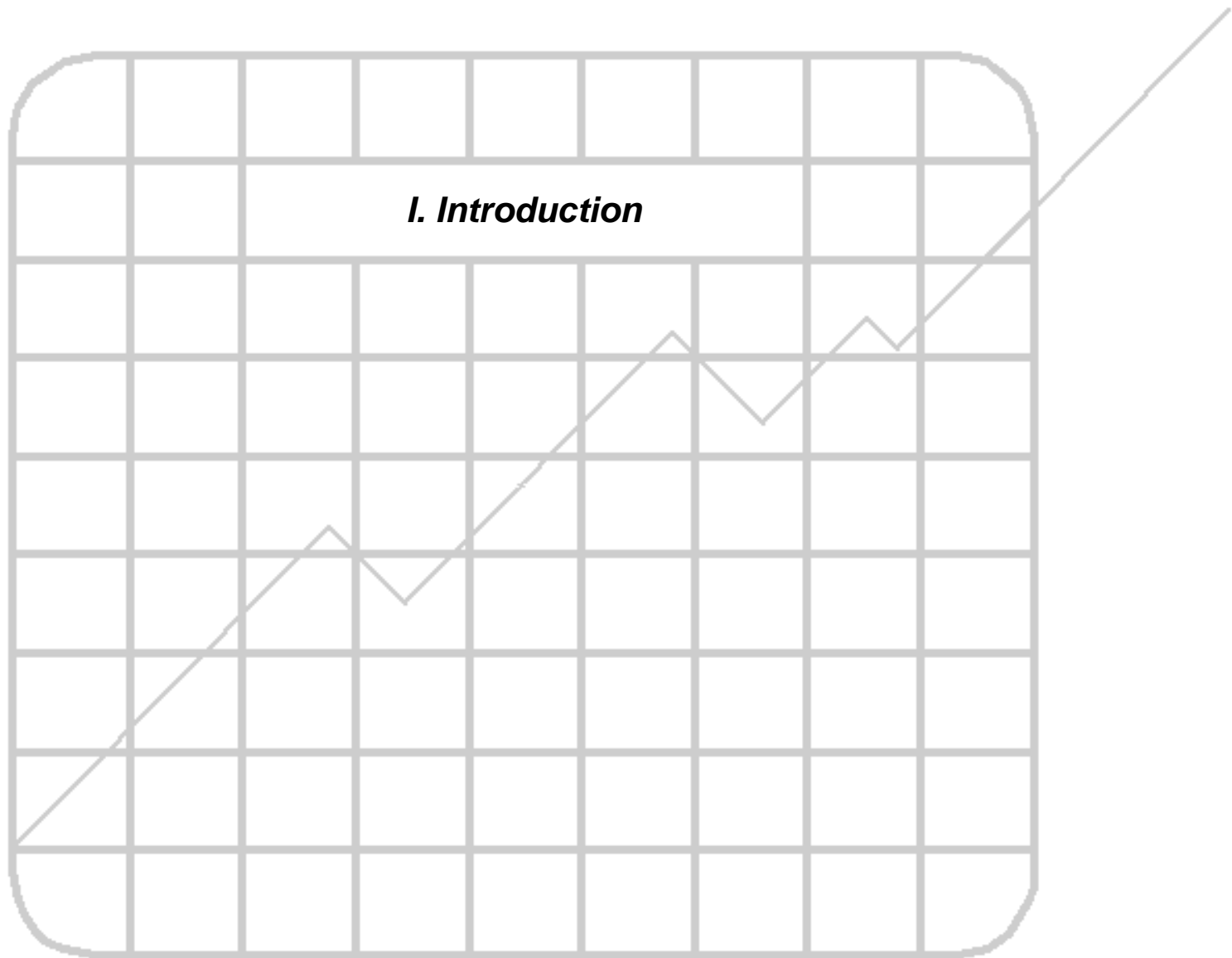

Methodology

This research study was commissioned by the New Mexico Children's Cabinet to assess perceptions New Mexico residents have about the needs of children and youth in the state, as well as determine perceptions about how New Mexico state government is addressing various children and youth issues.

The Interview

A random sample of New Mexico residents was interviewed by telephone. Telephone numbers were generated from the Research & Polling, Inc. database. All interviews were conducted between October 29 and November 2, 2003.

The telephone interviewers are professionals who are brought together for a training session prior to each survey. This ensures their complete and consistent understanding of the survey instrument. A total of 600 New Mexico adult residents completed interviews.

Margin of Error

A sample size of 600 at a 95% confidence level provides a maximum margin of error of 4.0%. In theory, in 95 out of 100 cases, the results based on a sample of 600 will differ by no more than 4.0 percentage points in either direction from what would have been obtained by interviewing all New Mexico adults.

Sample Bias

In any survey, there are some respondents who will refuse to speak to the professional interviewer. A lower response rate among certain types of individuals can result in a sample wherein certain types of individuals are over-represented or under-represented. The potential for sampling bias increases as the response rate decreases. Research & Polling, Inc. often sets quotas for various segments of the population who are historically undercounted. This has the effect of minimizing, but not necessarily eliminating, sampling bias.

The Report

This report summarizes the results from each question in the survey and reports on any variances in attitude or perception, where significant, among demographic subgroups. The subgroups examined in this report include:

- gender;
- age;
- length of NM residency;
- number of children in home;
- grade level of children;
- region.
- ethnicity;
- annual household income;
- education level;
- age of children;
- registered voter status;

Executive Summary

There are many different issues that children and youth in New Mexico must face and challenges that parents must overcome. When asked in an unprompted manner, what they feel are major issues facing children and youth in New Mexico, alcohol and drugs (43%) are mentioned most often, followed by educational issues (31%), issues related to gangs and violence (18%), and parental supervision and discipline (16%).

The majority (69%) of New Mexicans also feel it is harder to be a parent in the state today than it was 10 years ago, mainly for safety reasons, such as more crime, children are not as safe, more violence on television, and increased gang activity. Similarly, the majority of residents feel it is harder being a child or young person in New Mexico today than it was 10 years ago. However, when asked why they feel it is harder being a child, issues of pressure and stress on children and youth are mentioned most often, followed by issues pertaining to safety.

Two-thirds of adult residents feel it is a challenge to be a New Mexico parent raising children and keeping them safe, healthy, and educated in terms of having the financial means to support their children (67%), getting involved in their education (66%), and monitoring their behavior (66%). Furthermore, the majority of residents believe it is challenging for parents in terms of providing a safe environment at home (56%) and ensuring proper nutrition for their children (53%).

The majority (69%) of residents feel more children and youth are in need of health and social services today than they were 5 years ago. This is mainly because they feel there are fewer services available and more restrictions on welfare.

Children's Issues

When given a list of issues pertaining to New Mexico children (from birth through 12 years) and asked to rate how serious of an issue they feel each one is in their community, residents are more apt to feel the impact of domestic violence on children is a serious problem in their community, with 71% who rate this issue as serious (a score of 4 or 5 on a 5-point scale), followed by children with insufficient health insurance coverage (64%), and the issue of child abuse and neglect (63%). Issues such as the general health of children (39%), quality of daycare services (36%), and children

getting proper immunizations (34%) are less likely to be perceived as serious problems in their community.

When asked if they feel state government is addressing children's issues well, residents are more apt to say state government is doing a good job of addressing the proper immunization of children (45% give rating of 4 or 5), although one-fifth disagree. One-third of residents rate state government positively for addressing early learning and preparation for school (32%) and the general safety of children (32%), although residents have mixed feelings in that another one-third do not feel state government is addressing these issues well.

There is a significant gap between perceived seriousness of various children's issues and how well residents feel state government is addressing them. In fact, residents are more than twice as likely to feel some children's issues are a serious problem in their community than they are to give a good rating to state government for addressing issues, such as: the impact of domestic violence on children (71% and 30%, respectively), children with insufficient health insurance coverage (64% and 27%, respectively), and child abuse and neglect (63% and 27%, respectively). This is an indicator that state government needs not only to improve their efforts to address these issues, but should also consider increasing their efforts at informing the public about what they are doing to address these issues.

Teen Issues

When residents were asked about various issues pertaining to New Mexico teens, alcohol and drug abuse among teens ranked highest in terms of being a serious problem in their community, with 80% giving a rating of 4 or 5 on a 5-point scale, followed by teen pregnancy (74%), and violent activity among teens (71%). With regard to issues of academic performance and skills, approximately three-fifths of residents feel the high school dropout rate (63%), teens' skills and preparation for employment (61%) and truancy/non-attendance of school (61%) are serious problems in their community. In fact, residents estimate that an average of 35% and a median of 30% of New Mexico youth currently do not graduate from high school.

With regard to how well government is addressing various issues pertaining to New Mexico teens, residents give mixed ratings overall. Residents are most inclined to feel hunger among teens is being addressed well by state

government. Between one-fifth and one-quarter of residents give state government positive ratings for all other issues on which state government is evaluated. New Mexico government is given poor ratings for how well they are addressing issues such as: teen alcohol and drug abuse (46%), availability of after-school activities for teens (45%), teen pregnancy (45%), and violent activity among teens (45%).

As with children's issues in New Mexico, there is a significant gap between perceived seriousness of various teen issues and how well they are being addressed by state government. In fact, residents are more than three times as likely to rate some issues as serious problems than they are to give state government a positive rating for addressing issues such as: teen alcohol and drug abuse (80% and 24%, respectively), teen pregnancy (74% and 23%), and violent activity among teens (71% and 21%, respectively). Again, this gives an indication that more efforts should be in place to address these

issues, along with ensuring the public is well informed of state government's efforts to address these issues.

Given the perceived seriousness of issues affecting children and youth, it is not surprising that two-thirds of New Mexicans think state government should take more of a role in keeping children and youth safe, educated, and healthy. In fact, the vast majority (81%) of residents feel it is important for New Mexico state government to focus more on the safety, health, and education of children and youth instead of focusing on other issues. No single theme is present in terms of whether more efforts should be focused on one particular area of need. Many New Mexicans identify serious problems with specific safety, health, and education issues both for children and teens. New Mexico state government is faced with the challenge of trying to meet the needs of children and their parents on a wide variety of issues related to New Mexico children's safety, health, and education.

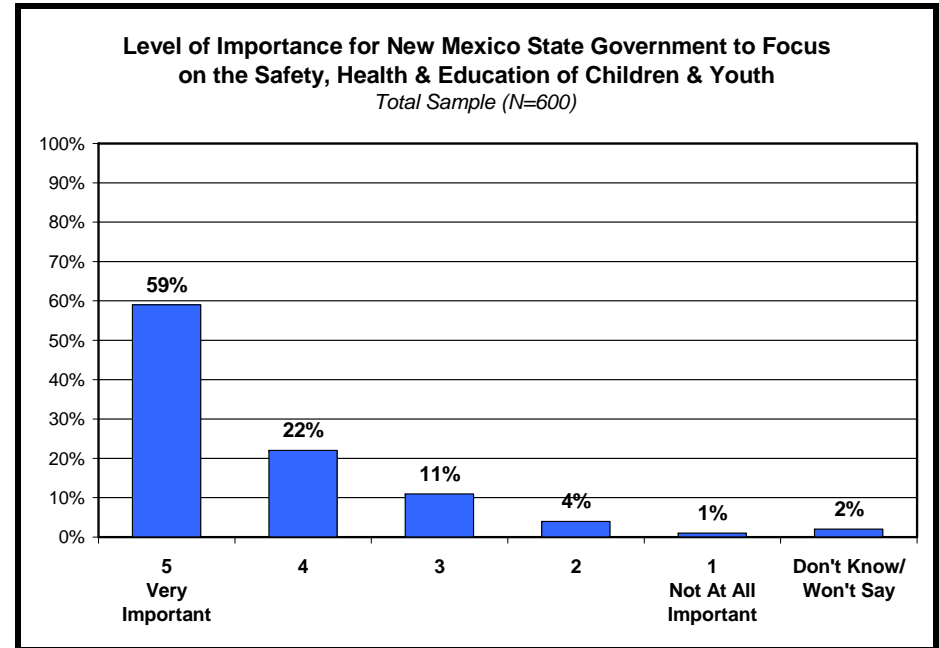
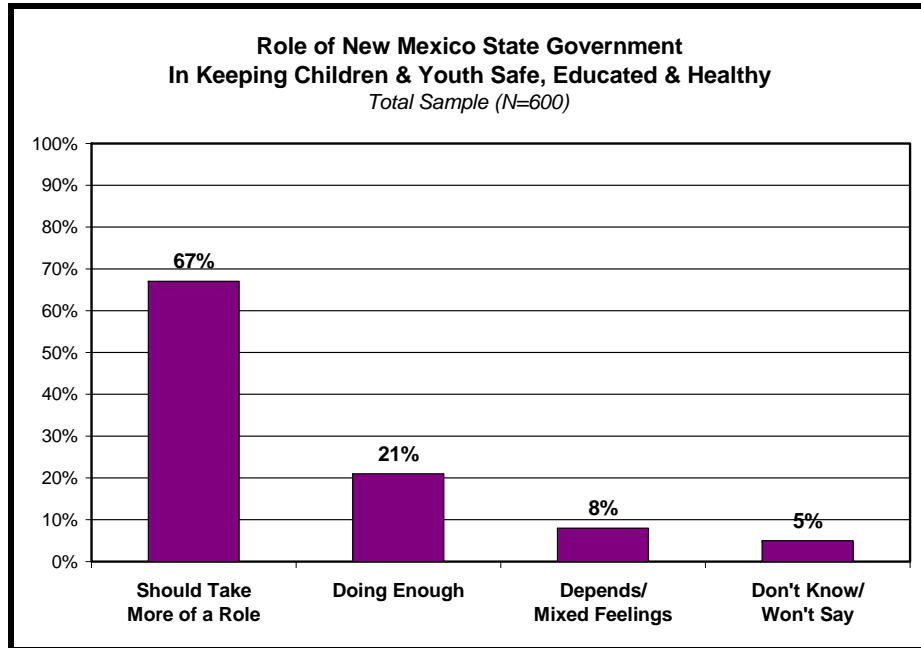

As previously mentioned, when asked in an unprompted manner what they feel are major issues facing children and youth in New Mexico, alcohol and drugs (43%) are mentioned most often, followed by educational issues (31%), issues related to gangs and violence (18%), and parental supervision and discipline (16%).

Those who are more likely to mention drugs as being a major issue facing children and youth in New Mexico include: Hispanics (44%), residents who are between 18 and 34 years of age (46%), those who have a high school education or less (42%), residents who have three or more children living in their home (51%), and those who live in northwestern New Mexico (49%).

Residents who have attended graduate school (40%), residents who live in the Albuquerque Metro area (32%), and Anglos (29%) are more likely than other groups to say poor quality of education is a major issue facing children and youth in New Mexico.



Two-thirds (67%) of residents think New Mexico state government should take more of a role in keeping children and youth safe, educated, and healthy, while one-fifth (21%) feel New Mexico state government is doing enough. Those who are more apt to feel New Mexico state government should take more of a role in keeping children and youth safe, educated, and healthy include: Hispanics (80%), residents who are between 18 and 34 years of age (76%), and those who live in the Albuquerque Metro area (73%) and North Central (72%) regions of New Mexico.

Residents were asked to rate, on a 5-point scale (where a score of 5 means *very important* and a score of 1 means *not at all important*), how important they feel it is for New Mexico state government to focus on the safety, health, and education of children and youth when compared to other issues it must focus on. Four-fifths (81%) of residents feel it is important (59% say it is *very important*) for New Mexico state government to focus on the safety, health, and education of children and youth when compared to other issues it must focus on, while just 5% do not feel it is important. Women (64%), Hispanics (69%), residents who earn less than \$40,000 annually (66%), those who have lived in New Mexico longer than 20 years (64%), and residents who have some college education or less (65%) are more inclined than other groups to say it is *very important* for New Mexico state government to focus on the safety, health, and education of children and youth.

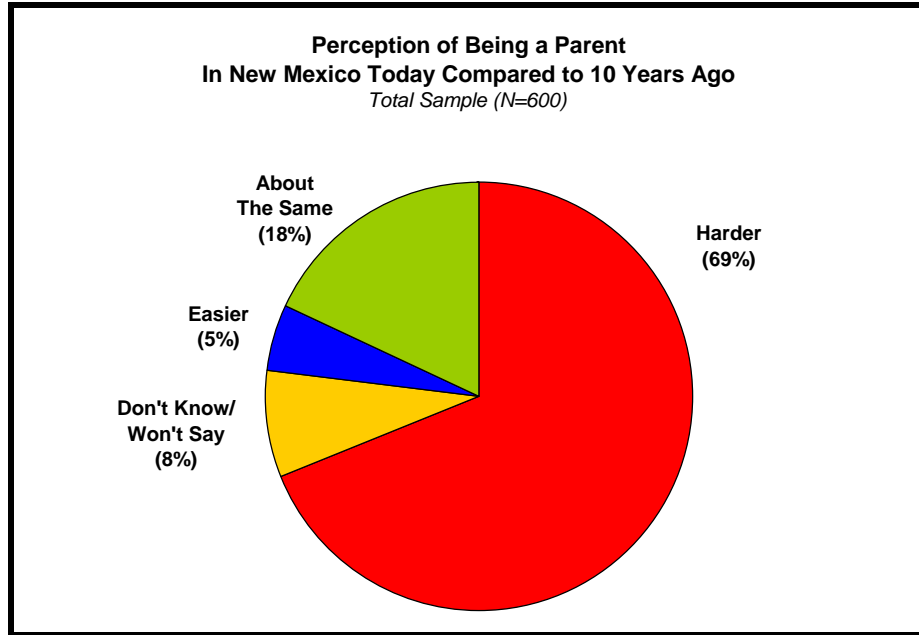

When asked to rate, on a 5-point scale (where a score of 5 means *very challenging* and a score of 1 means *not at all challenging*), how much of a challenge New Mexico parents face in terms of various aspects of raising their children, parents monitoring their children's behavior and disciplining them if necessary is rated highest, with two-thirds who feel this is challenging (47% feel it is *very challenging*). Parents getting actively involved in their children's formal education is seen as challenging for two-thirds of residents, with 46% who feel it is *very challenging*. Two-thirds (67%) of residents also find it a challenge for New Mexico parents to have the financial means to meet the needs of their children (45% feel it is *very challenging*). In fact, only 7% feel that having the financial means to meet the needs of their children is not a challenge, which is the fewest among each of the attributes tested.

With regard to providing a safe environment at home, 56% of residents feel this is a challenge for New Mexico parents (39% feel it is *very challenging*), while one-fifth (21%) do not feel this is a challenge. The majority (53%) of residents feel ensuring proper nutrition for their children is challenging for New Mexico parents (37% feel it is *very challenging*), while one-fifth (22%) of residents do not feel this is a challenge New Mexico parents face in raising their children. Forty-seven percent of residents feel it is a challenge for New Mexico parents in assuring their children receive their immunizations in a timely fashion (34% say it is *very challenging*), while 29% say it is not a challenge.

Women tend to be more likely than men to feel it is *very challenging* for New Mexico parents to raise children in terms of getting actively involved in their children's formal education, having the financial means to meet the needs of their children, and ensuring proper nutrition for their children. Hispanics are more likely than Anglos to feel parents getting actively involved in their children's formal education, providing a safe environment at home, and assuring their children receive their immunizations in a timely fashion is *very challenging* for New Mexico parents in raising their children. Residents who earn less than \$20,000 annually are more apt to say it is *very challenging* for New Mexico parents to raise their children in terms of monitoring their children's behavior and disciplining them if necessary and in terms of having the financial means to meet the needs of their children.

Parent in New Mexico Today As Compared to 10 Years Ago**

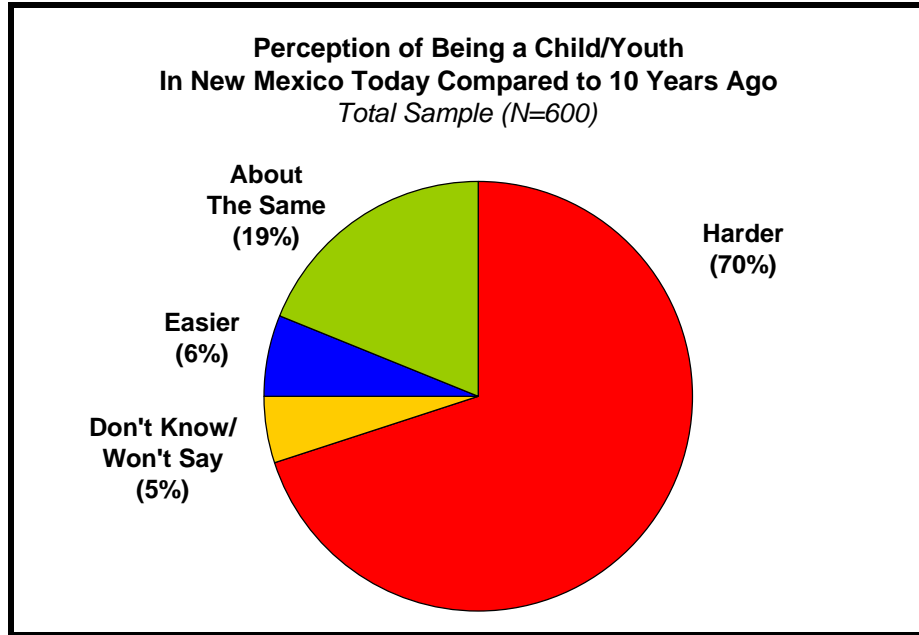

Over two-thirds (69%) of residents say it is harder being a parent in New Mexico today than it was ten years ago, while just 5% claim it is easier. Nearly one-fifth (18%) of residents say being a parent in New Mexico today is about the same as it was 10 years ago. Hispanics (81%), residents who earn less than \$40,000 annually (77%), those who have a high school education or less (77%), and women (76%) are more inclined than other groups to say it is harder being a parent in New Mexico today than it was 10 years ago.

Residents who have an opinion about being a parent in New Mexico today as compared to 10 years ago were asked in an unaided, open-ended manner why they feel this way. The most often mentioned reasons why it is harder being a parent in New Mexico today as compared to 10 years ago include: higher crime (20%), children not as safe (15%), more expensive (15%), both parents working (14%), and more violence on TV (14%).

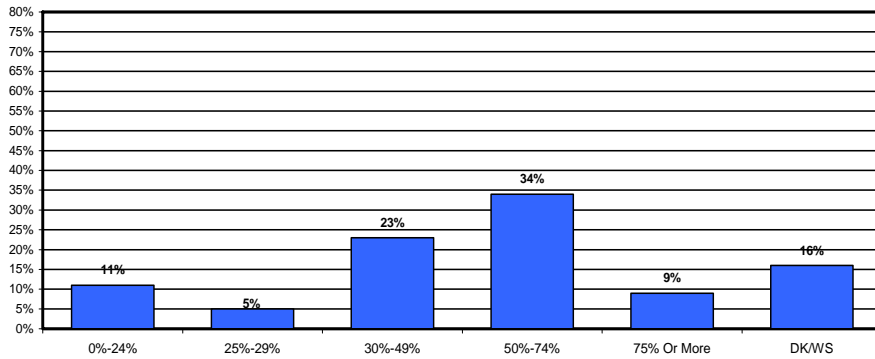

Seventy percent of residents feel it is harder being a child or young person in New Mexico today than it was ten years ago, while just 6% feel it is easier. One-fifth (19%) of residents feel being a child or young person in New Mexico today is about the same as it was 10 years ago. Hispanics (77%), residents who are 50 years of age or older (77%), and those who live in the North Central (80%) and Northwest (79%) are more apt than other groups to feel it is harder being a child or young person in New Mexico today than it was 10 years ago.

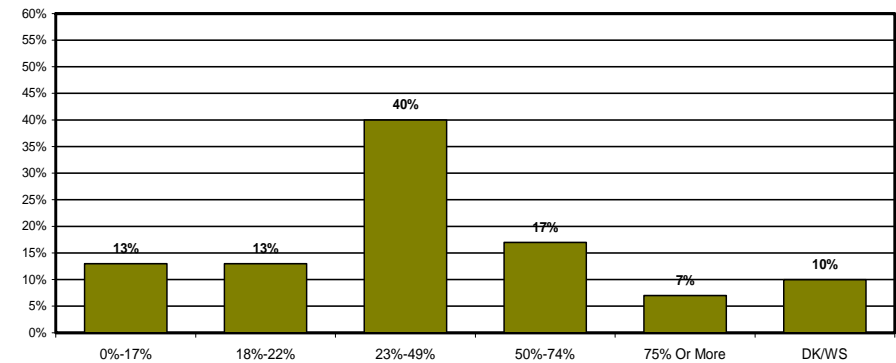
Residents who have an opinion about being a child or young person in New Mexico today as compared to 10 years ago were asked in an unaided, open-ended manner why they feel this way. The most often mentioned reasons why it is harder being a child or young person in New Mexico today as compared to 10 years ago include: more peer pressure (34%), more stress (26%), more crime (18%), and more violence in schools (17%).

Median Estimated Percentage: 50

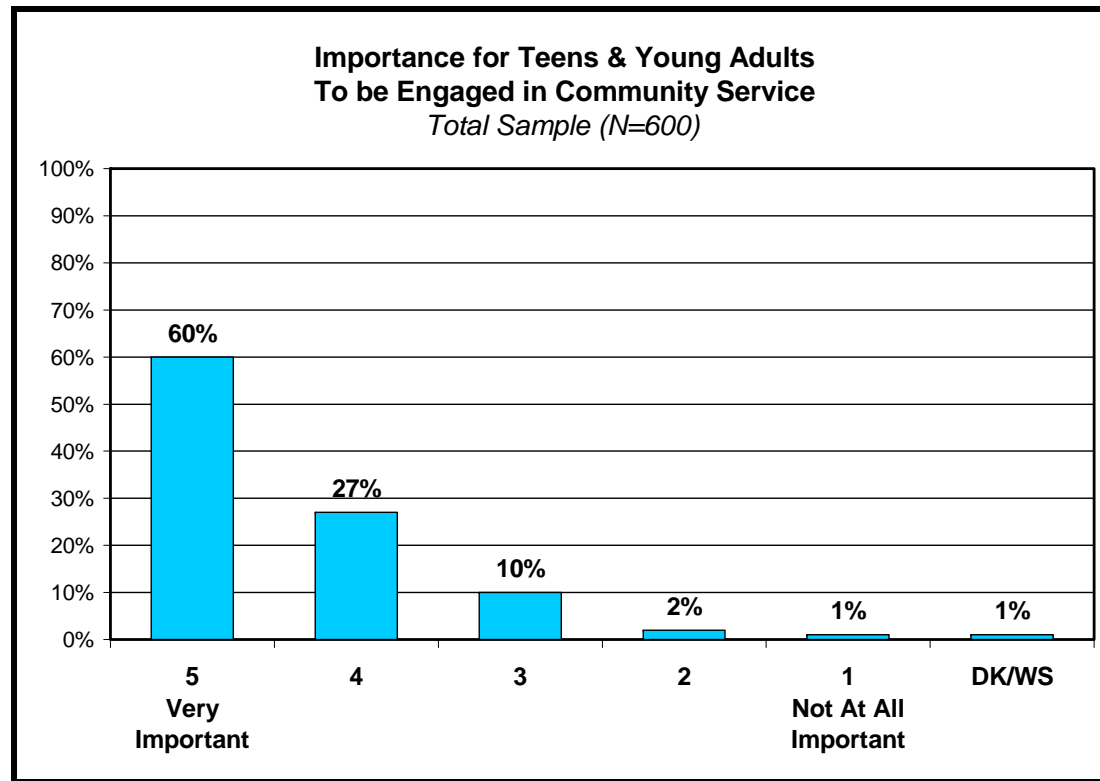
**Estimated Percentage of New Mexico Youth

Total Sample (N=600)



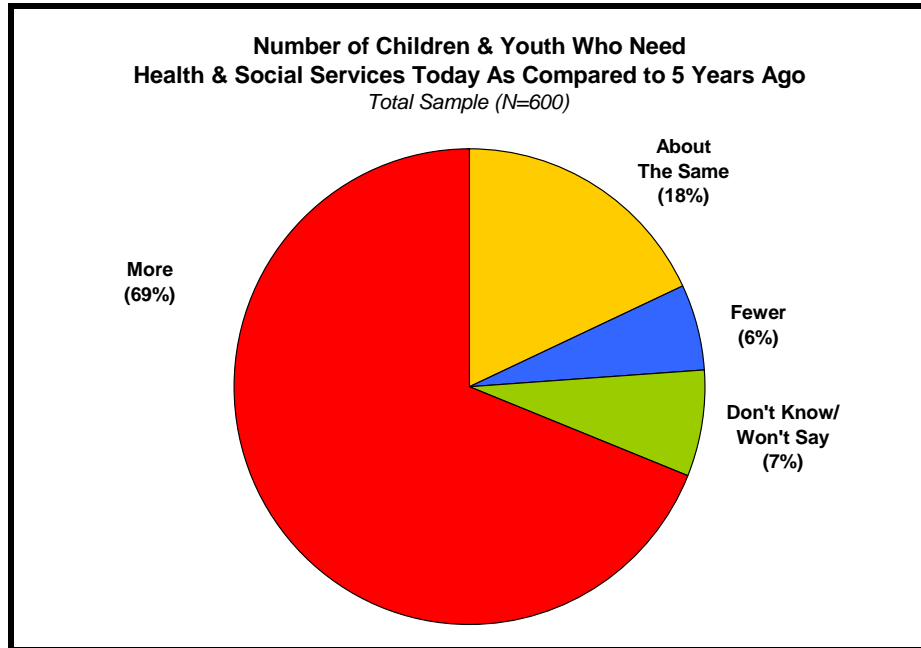

Residents were asked to indicate what percentage of New Mexico children and youth they estimate to be living at or below the poverty level. Eleven percent of residents estimate that 24% or fewer children live at or below the poverty level, which is an underestimation of the actual percentage (approximately 27% of children live at or below poverty level). Just five percent of residents give an estimation of the percentage of children at or below the poverty level that is near the true percentage (between 25% and 29%). Two-thirds of residents overestimate the percentage of children who are living at or below the poverty level, with 23% who feel it is between 30% and 49%, one-third (34%) who estimate it as being between one-half and 74%, and 9% who feel three-quarters or more of New Mexico's children are living at or below the poverty level.

When asked what percentage of New Mexico youth currently do not graduate from high school, 13% of residents give an underestimation (17% or less), while 13% give an estimation that is near the actual percentage who currently do not graduate from high school (between 18% and 22% do not complete high school). Nearly two-thirds (64%) of residents overestimate the percentage of New Mexico youth who currently do not graduate from high school, with two-fifths who say it is between 23% and 49%, 17% who estimate between one-half and 74%, and 7% who feel three-quarters or more of New Mexico youth currently do not graduate from high school.



When asked to rate, on a 5-point scale (where a score of 5 means *very important* and a score of 1 means *not at all important*), how important they feel it is for teens and young adults to be engaged in community service, the vast majority of residents (87%) feel it is important (60% feel it is *very important*), while just 3% do not think it is important for teens and young adults to be engaged in community service.

Over two-thirds (69%) of residents feel there are more children and youth in New Mexico who need health and social services today as compared to five years ago, while just 6% say fewer children and youth currently need health and social services. Approximately one-fifth (18%) of residents feel the number of children and youth who need health and social services today is about the same as it was five years ago.

When asked in an unaided, open-ended manner the reason for their perception about the number of children and youth who need health and social services today as compared to five years ago, the most often mentioned reasons why there are more children and youth who need health and social services include: fewer services available (52%), more restrictions for welfare (13%), poor economy/no jobs/poverty (6%), and more population/more children (5%).

Residents were given a list of various issues pertaining to New Mexico children (from birth through 12 years) and were asked to rate the seriousness of each issue or problem in their community on a 5-point scale (where a score of 5 means *very serious problem* and a score of 1 means *not a problem at all*). Of the issues listed, residents are most apt to feel the impact of domestic violence on children is a serious problem in their community (a score of 4 or 5), with 51% saying this is a *very serious problem*.

Approximately two-thirds of residents also believe children with insufficient health insurance coverage (64%) and abuse/neglect among children in New Mexico (63%) are serious problems. It is also observed that the majority of residents (54%) believe the public school/educational system is a serious problem in New Mexico, although 19% do not believe this is a problem (a score of 1 or 2). On a related note, just over half (52%) of residents believe the academic performance of children is a problem, while just 15% do not feel it is a problem and 28% have neutral or mixed feelings.

Each of the following issues are perceived as being a problem for children in New Mexico by approximately half of state residents: availability of affordable child care (50%), the child poverty level (53%) and the general safety of children (47%). The plurality of residents believe inadequate early learning and school preparation is a problem (42%) as is mental and behavioral health problems for children from birth through 12 years of age (43%). It should also be noted that nearly two-fifths (39%) of residents believe the general health of children in New Mexico is a problem.

Residents have somewhat mixed feelings about the homelessness of children as 33% feel this is a problem, while 32% do not. Furthermore, 36% believe there is a problem with the quality of daycare services for children, though one-in-four do not believe this is the case. It should be noted that one-in-five residents (19%) have not formed an opinion about the quality of day care services available. Finally, residents appear to be divided on the issue of immunizations as 34% believe proper immunization of children is a problem in New Mexico, while 35% do not feel it is a problem and 23% have neutral or mixed feelings.

Residents were asked to rate how well New Mexico state government is addressing each of the previously mentioned issues using a 5-point scale (where a score of 5 means *very well* and a score of 1 means *not at all well*). As shown above, residents give the state government mixed reviews in how well each of the issues listed above are being addressed. Overall, the state government received the highest ratings for providing proper immunizations for children, with 45% of residents giving a positive evaluation (a score of 4 or 5), though 20% do not believe government is doing well in this area (a score of 1 or 2).

While 32% believe the government is doing a good job of providing early learning programs and preparation for school, 32% disagree. Between 27% and 30% of residents give a positive evaluation for addressing issues such as: the impact of domestic violence on children, the public school/educational system, general health of children, homelessness of children, and insufficient health insurance coverage for children, although between 30% and 40% do not feel state government is addressing these issues well. Furthermore, nearly one-quarter (23%) of residents feel government is doing a good job of addressing the issue of the quality of daycare services for children, while 31% disagree. It should be noted that one-fifth (21%) of residents have not formed an opinion about how well state government is addressing this issue. However, residents with children between birth and 12 years of age are more likely to have formed an opinion about how well state government is addressing the quality of child daycare services.

It is observed that residents are twice as likely to disagree that state government is doing well in addressing the issue of the availability of affordable child care than they are to feel state government is addressing this issue well (41% and 21%, respectively). Finally, while one-fifth (22%) of residents feel the child poverty level is being addressed well by state government, nearly two-fifths (38%) disagree.

The table above shows the percentage of residents who believe the issues facing children (from birth through 12 years) in New Mexico are a serious problem (a combined score of 4 and 5 on a 5-point scale) and the percentage of residents who believe state government is addressing each issue in a positive manner (a combined score of 4 and 5). The larger the gap between the perceived seriousness of the issue and how well the government is addressing the problem is a strong indication that more needs to be done in this area. For example, while 71% of residents believe the impact of domestic violence on children is a serious problem, just 30% believe the state government is doing a good job of addressing this issue.

It is also observed that while approximately two-thirds of residents believe children with insufficient health insurance coverage (64%) and child abuse/neglect (63%) are serious problems in New Mexico, just 27% feel the government is doing a good job addressing them. Furthermore, residents are more than twice as likely to believe the child poverty level (53%) and children's academic performance (52%) are serious problems than they are to believe the government is addressing these issues in a positive manner (22% and 24%, respectively). The only issue which residents are more apt to give a positive evaluation for government addressing the issue than they are to believe it is a serious problem is the issue of providing proper immunizations to children (45% and 34%, respectively).

In addition to rating the seriousness of various issues affecting children, residents were asked to rate the seriousness of issues affecting teens in their community. As shown above, teen alcohol and drug abuse is perceived as the most serious problem as 80% give a rating of 4 or 5 on a 5-point scale. Three-quarters (74%) of residents also believe teen pregnancy is a serious problem, with half the residents saying it is a *very serious problem*. Similarly, 71% of residents believe violent activity among teens is a serious problem in their community.

Approximately two-thirds of residents believe the impact of domestic violence on teens (64%) and the high school drop out rate (63%) are serious problems in their community. It is also observed that approximately three-fifths of residents believe teens' skills and preparation for employment (61%) and truancy or non-attendance of school (61%) are serious problems. Notably, parents who have a teen are more apt to say truancy is a serious problem in their community (69%).

Relating to education, the majority (54%) of residents believe the availability of after-school activities for teens is a problem, though one-in-five residents do not believe this is problem. The majority (54%) of residents also believe teens with insufficient health insurance coverage is a problem as is the academic performance among teens (52%), and just under half (48%) believe mental health and behavioral problems among teens is a problem. Residents are least apt to believe teen homelessness (32%) and hunger (33%) are problems among teens in their community.

As was observed among children, residents give very mixed reviews for how well the New Mexico state government is doing in addressing teen issues in New Mexico. Using the same 5-point scale (where 5 is *very well* and 1 is *not at all well*), residents are most apt to feel state government is doing a good job of dealing with teen hunger (29%), though 28% believe the government is doing a poor job in this area.

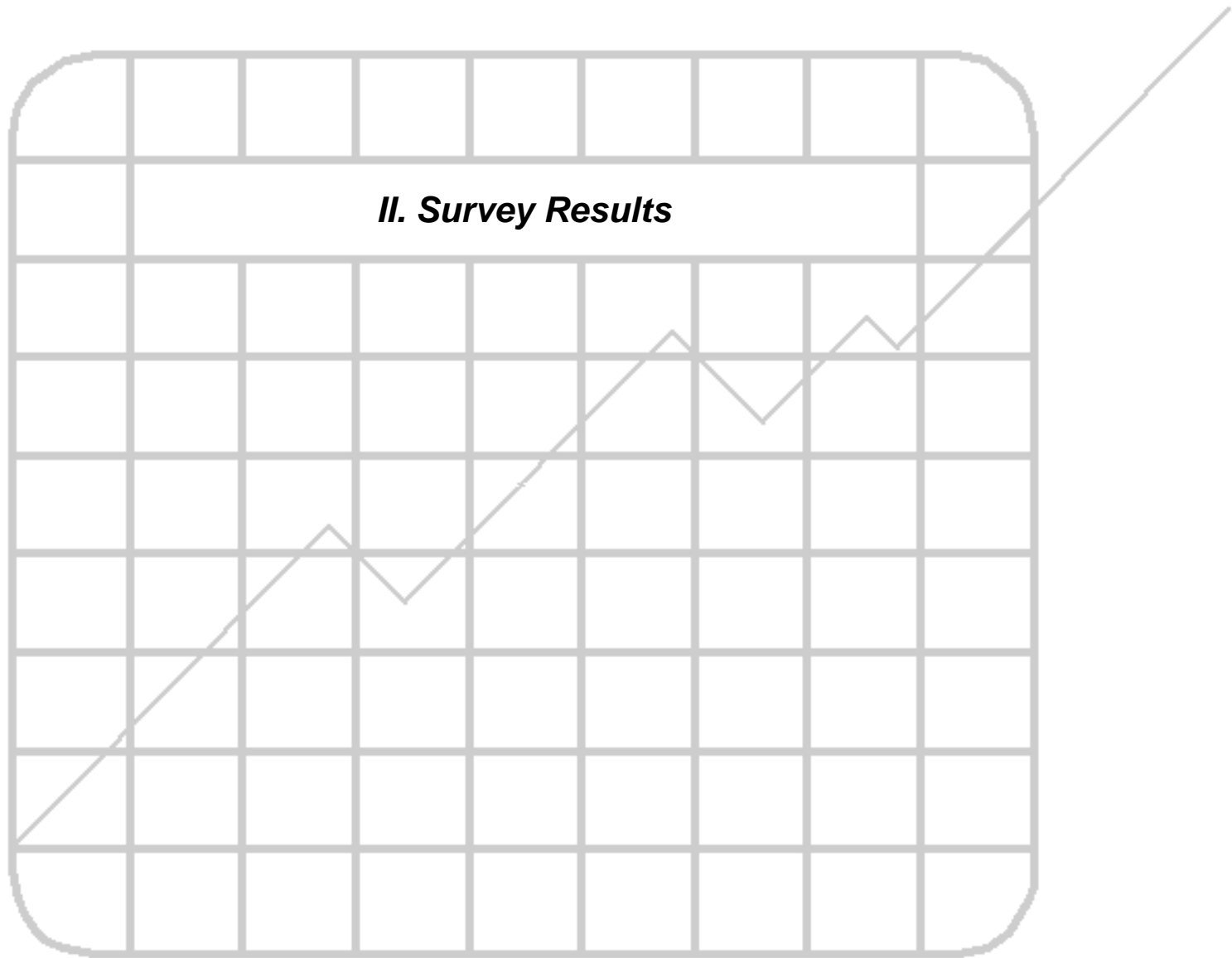
Between 20% and 27% of residents statewide give the state government a positive evaluation for each of the remaining issues listed. Those issues which residents are most apt to believe state government is doing a poor job of addressing include teen alcohol and drug abuse (46%), teen pregnancy (45%), availability of after-school activities (45%), and violent activity among teens (45%).

It is important to note that, while only one-quarter of residents feel state government is doing a good job of addressing the issue of teens with insufficient health insurance coverage, 35% of residents who have a teen feel state government is addressing this issue well. It is also observed that residents with teens are less likely to say state government is doing a good job of addressing the issues of teen academic performance and teen's skills and preparation for employment.

Again, looking at the differences between perceived seriousness of the issues and how well state government is addressing each issue, it is observed that residents are more than three times as likely to say teen alcohol and drug abuse is a serious problem as they are to feel state government is doing a good job of addressing the issue (80% and 24%, respectively). Very similar results are observed for teen pregnancy, violent activity among teens, the impact of domestic violence on teens, and teens' skills and preparation for employment in that residents are approximately three times as likely to feel it is a problem as they are to feel it is being addressed well.

While over three-fifths (63%) of residents believe the high school drop out rate is a serious problem in New Mexico, just 24% believe the state government is doing a good job of addressing the issue. It is also observed that residents are approximately twice as likely to believe truancy/skipping school, availability of after-school activities for teens, insufficient health care coverage, academic performance and teen mental/behavioral health problems are serious issues as they are to feel government is doing a good job in addressing them.

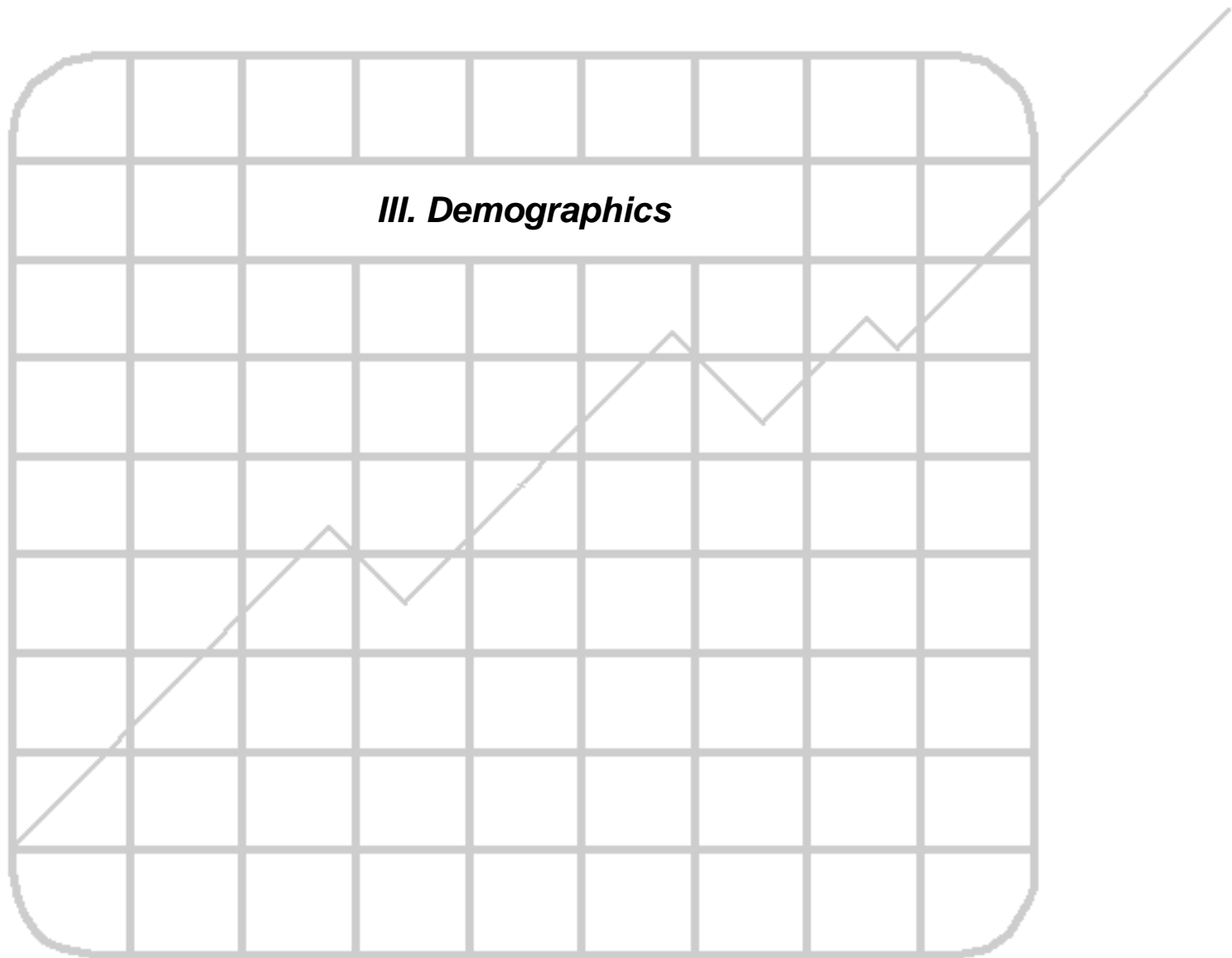

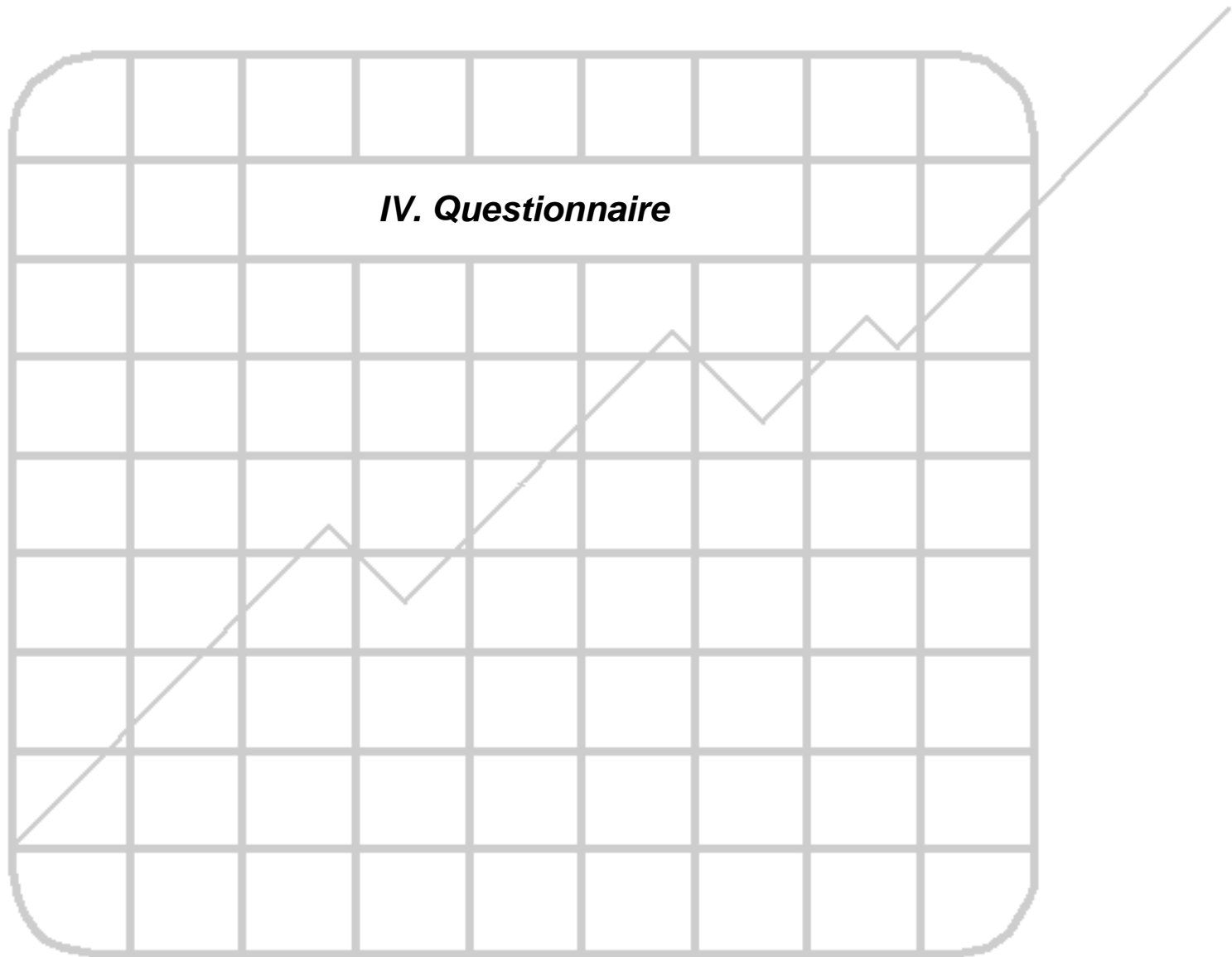
